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"The Real Inspector Hound" is presented by arrangement with Concord Theatricals on behalf of Samuel French, Inc.

One word in the title is easily overlooked yet colours every interaction: "Real" – first used as a subtle jab at Agatha Christie's long-running stage play The Mouse-trap as Stoppard parodies its isolated manor, repeated radio announcements and questionable detective character. "Real" takes Stoppard's 1968 play a step beyond mere parody of popular source material. The first thing that most audiences see in Stoppard's stage direction, is "their own reflection". He mirrors the present day but not real reality, only its reflection. From Aristotle's mimesis to Hamlet staging his own Mousetrap and holding "a mirror up to nature" (III.ii), the idea of theatre reflecting reality continues to stir up debate. Even the two critics sitting in the audience are distorted reflections of the playwright Stoppard who was a theatre critic early in his writing career.

What about the inner play set in the drawing room at Muldoon Manor? The swamps and deadly seaside cliffs are unreal yet these details remain outside the drawing room. Lady Muldoon, Mrs. Drudge and Simon Gascoyne are stock characters from any typical murder mystery, yet something about the inner world of the play gives them a deeper sense of reality. According to climate activist Naomi Klein, such doppelgängers reveal our own doubles: "who and what we cannot bear to see" (Klein, 2024, p.



322). Recreating the 1977 Cranbrook Community Theatre production, we attempt to capture the conscience of our East Kootenay audience in this inner play. Soon both critics and the audience get pulled into this deeper reality.

Kyle Stoshnoe

Director of The Real Inspector Hound by Tom Stoppard

BIO: Kyle moved to Kimberley in December 2022 to start work at College of the Rockies after completing his graduate studies in drama education and educational technology at the University of British Columbia. The first play that he directed was Shakespeare's Antony and Cleopatra for the Vancouver International Fringe Festival in 2000. 



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The Studio Stage Door

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Originally built in 1909 as a Masonic Temple, the building was designed by Thomas Daltry Sedger (1860-1941), an English architect who lived in Esquimault, BC for 49 years.

By 1973, the local Masons could no longer afford to heat the building and offered it for sale. Because the only prospective buyer wanted to demolish it to build a parking lot, the Cranbrook Community Theatre Society (CCT) lobbied the City of Cranbrook to get involved and purchase the building. This movement, spearheaded by Bud Abbott and Cornel Sawchuk, resulted in the successful purchase by the City, who then turned stewardship of the building over to the CCT.

By actively preserving and renovating, the CCT was able to have the structure deemed a heritage building of British Columbia in 1989.

Over decades of stewardship, the building has seen thousands of students and hundreds of theatre and musical presentations and events. The CCT members and volunteers have invested a great many hours of time and, as of 2021, more than one million dollars on the upkeep and renovation of this much-loved building.

Cranbrook Community Theatre members remain very grateful that the City had the foresight to rescue the building and are very proud of their efforts to maintain such a handsome heritage structure for residents and visitors to use and enjoy.
